

KONFERENSSIN OHJELMA / CONFERENCE PROGRAM

Tämän vuoden Antropologipäivien kantavana teemana on arvon käsite. Arvon käsitteen moninaisuus liittää sen suureen määrään erilaisia tutkimusaiheita, ja viime aikoina tutkijat ovat olleet erityisen kiinnostuneita eri arvojärjestelmien yhtymäkohdista. Esimerkiksi taloudellisia ja eettisiä arvoa koskeneissa keskusteluissa on pyritty selvittämään, mitä yhteistä toisilleen vastakkaisilla tai toisistaan etäällä olevilla arvokäsityskäytäntöillä voisi olla. Antropologipäivillä tarkastellaan muun muassa rahaa ja valuuttaa, aineellista kulttuuria ja taidetta, yhteiskunnalliset liikkeitä ja poliittisia arvoja, teknologiaa ja ympäristöä, kieltä ja puhetta. Käsitteen tutkiminen ja kartoittaminen onkin yksi Antropologipäivien tärkeimmistä tavoitteista.

Päivien pääpuhujat ovat professori emeritus Keith Hart (Goldsmiths & University of London), professori Jukka Siikala (Helsingin yliopisto) ja Dr. Martin Holbraad (University College London).

Antropologipäivät järjestää Suomen Antropologinen Seura. Tapahtumaa tukevat Tieteellisten seurain valtuuskunta ja Helsingin yliopisto.

The principal theme of this year's Finnish Anthropology Conference is the exploration of the concept of value. This theme introduces a notion which has been employed in anthropology and related disciplines to illuminate economic, ethical, linguistic, aesthetic, and political aspects of the human experience. Recent discussions about ethical and economic value, for example, have sought to discover what seemingly opposite notions of value could have in common. The multiple meanings and uses of the value concept connect it to a wide variety of research topics: money and currencies, technology and the environment, art and material culture, social movements and political values, language and speech - just to mention a few examples. Exploration of the concept, therefore, is an important conference goal.



A documentary about the struggle of an Indian girl, Kusum, and her family against illness and spirits
- 11.15 *Where the Peul Go*
Sylvain Vesco, Free Band Production, 2007 (52')
The Peuls are a cattle-herding tribe in Mali, one of the poorest countries in the world. They talk about what "Development" and "Modernization" mean to them and to their cattle.

The film investigates aspects of artefact trade in Solomon Islands and analyses the present situation and context of stolen museum artefacts in the international art market.

Aspects of tattooing traditions on the Polynesian Bellona and Rennell Islands (Mungiki and Mungaba) in the southern Solomon Islands. Highlighted in the film is the most central tattooing ritual, the Haka'anga.
